



How to Use Directed Reading to Augment Your High School Diploma


Directed Reading courses are designed to enable high school students to tailor their learning in almost any area of interest. The Directed Reading program also provides the student with a great deal of flexibility in time and place of learning. Directed reading is not classroom instruction but outside the classroom learning.

At Citizens High School you can complete your readings and supporting work in as little as four weeks, or you can expand your time of study for up to one year. The basic course structure is centered around reading 3 books in 4 months to earn 1 credit. You also have the flexibility of varying the completion time of each course from 1 month to 1 year and complete as many directed reading courses as you would like during your time in high school.

The directed reading course program offers the student the opportunity to explore in detail any area of interest to them. The student can elect to take one course or several directed reading courses over the time they attend high school. A student could elect to earn 3 directed reading credits each year by reading 3 books every 4 months or 12 books per year. If done over 4 years, the student could earn 12 high school credits or the equivalent of 12 extra courses tailored to their specific area of learning.






Using Directed Reading to Support Your Local High School Graduation

Although your high school diploma may require between 18 to 24 credits or more to graduate, there are no restrictions to the number of credits you can earn while you attend high school. If your local high school diploma program only allows for 3 or 4 electives, it does not mean you cannot take extra elective courses if your school does not offer them.

Case Study #1: Students' major areas of interest is Civics

Directed Reading Course on Social Justice issues. The student can tailor their reading to fit their interest. This example shows a two-course directed reading program.


The student can take the following Directed Reading Courses in Civics and transfer them to their local high school:
